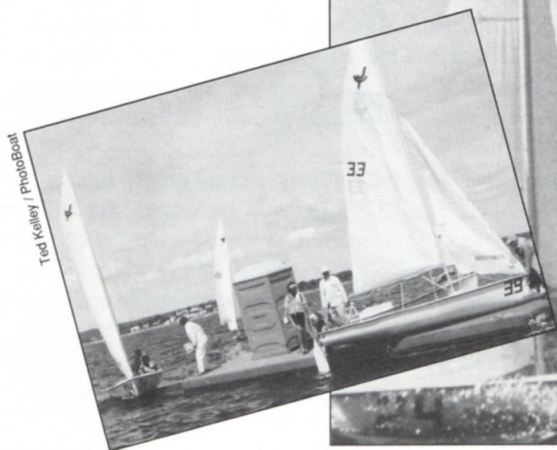

Stonington, September 9, 1990—

Forty-nine JY15's from all over the US and Canada arrived at Stonington's Wadawanuck Yacht Club Friday to compete in the first North American Championship Regatta. Mostly blue skies and winds to 18 knots made ideal conditions for the two-day, best of five series, won by Carter Gowrie of Westbrook, Connecticut and crew Jennifer Adam.

Gowrie and Adam were also the first JY15 racers to take home the Dow Trophy, a special perpetual award donated by the Dow Chemical Company, which manufactures the tough RovelTM plastic used for the JY's outer skin. The trophy will be up for grabs again at the next North Americans, scheduled for September 6-9.

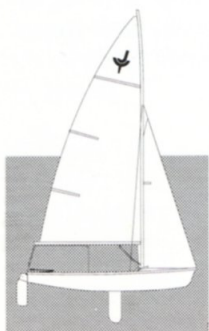
The weekend's racing started with a bang Saturday as skipper Tim Robinson and crew ran quick off the line in the first race. By the windward mark, Gowrie and Adam were in the lead, closely followed by Jeff Morgan and William Rothwell. The two boats traded leads around the Gold Cup

course, with Morgan and Rothwell taking the first of three races. But by the end of the day they were out of the pack, with Gowrie & Adam in the lead, Skip and Richard Moorhouse in second, and Bill Boatwright and Louisa Holt in third.

The race course had an interesting feature that turned a few heads: anchored right there in the middle of Fisher's Island Sound, just West of the downwind mark, was a small barge with what appeared to be a blue pilothouse. Closer inspection revealed that the barge was actually a dock, and the pilot house a portable toilet. Many racers were relieved to see it, and no one mistook it for a mark.

Competition turned to camaraderie Saturday night as 150 sailors and supporters launched into a buffet dinner, amply supported with refreshments courtesy of Budweiser. Speeches were short and smiles were wide as the day's racing was analyzed, and after door prizes were awarded the crowd got down to some serious singing with Rod Johnstone on banjo and Carter

WILDERNESS ADVENTURE SAILING

Sometimes in life a sailor gets the urge to return to the roots of his boating passion and take off in a dinghy on a fun sailing adventure. I had the urge, the JY15 was my boat. I had the perfect regatta - a week long, point to point sail on incredibly beautiful water that surpasses a sailor's imagination of a Canadian/Minnesota lake. Lake of the Woods is a huge border lake amid 14,630 islands with 65,000 miles of shoreline.

The event is the annual regatta in August hosted by the Lake of the Woods International Sailing Association (LOWISA) which starts and ends in Kenora, Ontario. On this 25th LOWISA, a special celebration was planned for the 120 boats entered. I was excited to sail the JY15 to counter the big boat trend. I felt this seven day, 125 mile JY15 emersion would help me get to know the boat better also.

Though I slept in a tent each night, I was prepared to sleep on the JY if I could not find suitable camp sites. Sure it's not a cruiser and a die-hard I am not, but the idea has merits if you stretch out in the JY and consider the problems of wilderness camping.

The JY was very enjoyable and surprisingly comfortable, even the day we sailed 25 miles, hiking in a stiff breeze.

I have never sailed a boat as comfortable in light air. For long periods my crew and I were stretched out on opposite sides across the boat and never moved while tacking upwind. The long sails gave me an opportunity to experiment with tuning and techniques on the boat as well as enjoy the natural beauty.

My friends who thought they would never see me by sunset were surprised by the performance of the JY. Even with my experience in the boat, I was pleased by the way it moved in light air upwind. The rocky shorelines posing as a menace to keelboats allowed us to free our air and work the shore breeze.

I entered this adventure knowing youth is not eternal and thus expecting it to be an endurance event on a dinghy. It was not this at all. I credit much of this feeling to the JY. As the big boats motored out, we would just sail from the camp site. When asked if I would do it again in the JY15 I replied that I most certainly would but I would like more dinghies to sail against, preferably JY15s.

So if you want an exceptional wilderness sailing adventure with lots of boats and fun/people, give me a call and bring your JY to LOWISA 26. The island scenery with craggy shorelines and towering pines is spectacular. With all the boats converging in one anchorage, the parties and fellowship are memorable. You will get to know and appreciate your boat like never before. If you prefer, there are alternatives to hard core camping.

Those are just some of the words that I use to describe this regatta. For many of the JY15 sailors this was their first time participating in this regatta. A total of thirteen boats participated with teams representing Connecticut, Massachusetts, South Carolina, North Carolina, Florida and Texas.

On Friday the JY15's congregated on the banks of vast Monroe Lake. The wind had built to a steady 25 knots with gusts. We were hoping to go for a practice sail but only sailboards and a few catamarans ventured out in those conditions. By Friday afternoon the entire area was buzzing with activity. Over 500 boats, as small as Optimists and as large as J24's, were making their vessels ready for the competition that lay ahead. It was an impressive site.

Saturday morning the conditions were 15-18 knots with some light chop. Three races were completed as planned. Dick Tillman and his wife Linda had a commanding lead with three wins.

After two days of persistent wind that was strong enough to clear away all cobwebs, there was not a breath of air to be found Sunday morning. Slowly boats were launched. The wind finally filled in to about 12-15 knots. Two races were run which completed the on-water portion of the regatta.

This regatta also had another dimension to offer to everyone. Late Friday demonstrations and lectures were given by celebrity sailors. The topics were varied. Of particular interest was a lecture given by Allison Jolly and Lynne Jewell who shared stories of their successful Olympic Gold Medal quest in 1988. Other accomplished sailors that made presentations included Jim Brady, Ed Baird and Larry Klein.

It was a wonderful regatta and it was great to see so many JY15's participate. I would encourage all of you to consider this regatta for your schedule this year.

Jim Howard and Peter Finkelstein (Isotope Catamaran) showed they could master a monohull by winning the first afternoon race, but McGregor held his lead with a second and locked up the championship with wins in the final two races.

Ed Michels (Lightnings), Lawrence Miller (Tanzer) and Jonathan Jones (Junior Sailing) sailed a great series and showed just how close good one-design racing can be.

Fleet 19 joined the Carolina Sailing Club Championship series in July with active participation until the season closed at the end of October. Russ Norburn wound up first for the season, followed by Chris Margano second, and Bob Taylor third. Lack of wind caused racing to be cancelled August 18. However the N.C. State sailors were able to keep everyone entertained and established a world record by piling 15 people in one JY15 without sinking it.

FLEET 20 **Whortonsville Yacht & Tractor Club** **Oriental, NC**

JY15 Fleet 20, based in the friendly coastal village of Whortonsville, NC, was chartered in September with four members and immediately scheduled a series of events for the balance of the season which concluded late in November. It might have been the salubrious effect of that jam session, but Sunday's two races were scooped by Rod Johnstone and crew Graeme Woodworth, which combined with their modest performance Saturday gave them a 7th overall. A strong showing by the double team of Chris & Vicki Field (Saturday) and Carl & Val Fast (Sunday's races) gave their boat a 2nd overall. 3rd place for the series went to Moorhouse & Moorhouse.

The unusual double team arrangement of the Fields and the Fast was the result of a unique new racing strategy: on Saturday's racing, the Fields got the boat and the Fast got the kids. On Sunday, the tiller and the tots switched again. Both pairs of parents got to race, and both get credit for second place overall.

Crews came in just about every configuration imaginable— 3 father & son teams, 4 family crews, 14 husband & wife boats, 4 couples, and 24 assorted.

Actual winning strategies were less the result of babysitting schedules than racing smarts. Carter Gowrie, who had only been in a JY15 twice before (although he's sailed for 30 years) credits fast starts for his winning performance, while both Johnstone and the Fast team took advantage of weaker currents on the shore side of the course. Tight finishes throughout the fleet, which included sailors of all experience levels, showed once again that the JY15 is the ideal family one-design racer. Crews came in just about every configuration imaginable: 3 father & son teams, 4 family crews, 14 husband & wife boats, 4 couples, and 24 assorted. The common denominator is just a love of sailing, and a chance at winning.

Having a competitive spirit also helps. David Dunn and Aron Rosenberg, who ended up in the water four times, pulled out and kept going on each occasion. That performance won them the Sailing World Sportsmanship Award, presented Sunday during the awards ceremonies.

This year we showed that we can host a good-sized event at our modest club, and we are looking forward to hosting the North Americans again in 1991. Mark your calendars for September 6 - 9, Stonington, Connecticut!

CHANGES TO JY15 CLASS RULES

The minimum main and jib sheet diameter (Sections 4.3c and 4.3e in the Class Rules) should be changed to read

"...rope not less than 3/8 diameter."

After much discussion, the overwhelming opinion is to allow a longer tiller extension. We have added section 3.2.1. It reads:

"The tiller extension may be any length except that it shall not exceed 42" in length."

After a rigorous search for the 'right' boat, the Fort Worth Boat Club is pleased to announce the formation of a one design fleet. A charter has been issued to the FWBC in Fort Worth for JY Fifteen Fleet 25. Thirteen JY Fifteens have been reserved with the club continuing to sign up members until January 15. The One Design Sailor, the JY15 dealer located on Clear Lake, TX, said the boats will be delivered to the club at a ceremony to be held in March of 1991.

Current racing activity at the Fort Worth Boat Club has been centered around a large assortment of keel boats. While this has led to some exciting and very competitive racing, the members have been anxious for a sailing activity that allows them to venture out and compete on a regular basis at other sailing clubs.

Mark Witte, the FWBC one-design fleet captain, said their purpose in forming the new fleet was to 1) have fun, 2) compete outside the FWBC, 3) aid in the learning process, and 4) attract new members for both one-design racing and participation in the keelboat fleet. Jon and Karen Wright of Philadelphia walked away with the regatta finishing 15.75 points ahead of Peter Vessella/Chris Bellenger team, from Warwick, RI.

The first race was led most of the way by Jeff Udell only to have Peter Vessella sneak by for the win. Second race was won by local Laser ace and Finn Olympic hopeful Steve Rhodes who ended up sixth overall. Race three was Peter and Ann Freeman's, but those holes on the second lap did them in. Keith Behnke emerged as the winner, as the series was still up for grabs. Skip and Jean Moorhouse won race four while the Wright team blew the field away winning the last three races handily.

The award banquet was the culmination of a week of daily regattas put on by the Liberty Yacht Club featuring the Soviet/American Women's Whitbread crews.

some of whom had never seen a JY15 before. A total of eight races were required to determine the top three finishers. Fleet Captain, Kevin Bryan, emerged as the over all winner and Jeannette Santoro in the runner-up spot, and several visiting skippers as potential JY15 owners.

Kevin then packed up his boat on top of his car, just to prove it could be done, and set off for the JY15 North American Championship in Stonington, CT, some 800 miles away. He not only made it there and back with his equipment intact, he finished respectably in the middle of the 50 boat fleet.
