The President's Agenda was adopted.

Correspondence:

A. A letter was received from Pino Ferlini from the Associazione Italiana Classe Yngling stating that the Class is developing and the organisation is now ready to join in with IYA matters.

C. A request to hold the 1995 WC was received from Club Nautique De Versoix in Switzerland. From Gromnitzer Segelklub in Germany a request to hold the 1995 WC and the 1996 EC was received.

D. The formal Request from the Royal Sydney Yacht Squadron for the 1996 WC.

1. The 1994 AGM was opened at 2:15 pm 9/7/94 at SEATRONICS Moss.

2. Ingemar Stromblad and Chris Harper were elected Chairman and Secretary respectively.

3. The agenda was adopted.

4. The Presidents Annual Report was read and adopted.

5. The report from the auditors was tabled and adopted.

6. The Executive Committee was discharged and thanked for their hard work over the past year.

7. Ingemar Stromblad was elected for another year by unanimous vote as President.

8. As was Svein Andreasen as Vice President.

9. As was Chris Harper as Secretary.

10. As was Gunther Schmidt – Ginzkey as Treasurer.

11. ACF S. A. were appointed as certified auditors.

12. Per Thorshoej was appointed as Chief Measurer.

13. The President noted that Official Class Measurers were to be listed and published in the Yngling Magazine and The Chief Measurer will organise the list.

The Yngling Club expressed concerns over the price of the Yngling, and the Club has put a lot of energy into their new strategy and have a new committee.

14. The previous Technical Committee was re-elected.

15. The President was appointed as the IYRU delegate.

16. The 1994-5 budget was tabled and adopted. In order to be able to print a new guide the membership fee and the cost for sail labels will rise to 20SF. The Technical Committee will rewrite the Guide.

17. It was decided that Gromitzer Segel Club will be asked to include the Ynglings in the Gromitzer Woche with a special arrangement so that the racing will be from the 30th of June to the 5th of July 1995.

The 1995 WC application from Club Nautique De Versoix 7th to the 15th of July was accepted with the procedure to be 5 races completed before a lay day.

The 1996 WC will be held in Sydney as per the advance notice of race ie, Open Australian Championship Dec. 24 1995 – Dec. 31 1995.

WC 1996 Dec. 31 – Jan. 7. Alternative courses and pool racing may be required.

The 1996 European Championship will be held at Gromitzer Segel Club. Jul. 5 – 12.

18. A list of amendments to rule 7 IYA Rules was tabled and adopted.

19. 20. The Chief Measurers Report was given as per the Minutes of the Technical Committee.

The report was accepted with an addition to the "float test procedure", ie all boats to be tested may be tested upon the owners request at any time during the Regatta.

21. A proposal for changes (drafted by C. Brask Thomson and B. Chaffee) was tabled for editing by the President, Secretary, Chief Measurer, Treasurer and C. Brask Thomson.

The changes are for the IYA Class and Championship Rules.

22. A Match Racing Rules Committee is to be formed to write a set of Class Rules.

Names suggested are S. Hatch, N. Wittey, S. Mohr, J. Bendix.

23. A proposal for a committee from Denmark, Norway and Sweden should be asked to write a set of Nordic Championship Rules was adopted. The president is to organise.

24. Proposals were tabled for the Y Magazine and Spot News to remind NYA's about what is required and when, to contain the costs and meet delivery the date.

25. A report on how to market Yngling Associations and the racing was presented by the secretary as well as some ideas on presentations.

26. The Dutch reported on their strategy on making new fleets.

27. Other Business – The Australian President reported a pilot program with disadvantaged youth that is being undertaken in outer Sydney with Botany Bay Yacht Club.

28. The date of the next meeting is Sat 8th July 1995 with the Technical Committee meeting just prior. The meeting closed at 19:47.





IYA Expenditure 1993-1994



Over Income** (1,119.6)



Measurer's Corner

WC 1994

At the WC 1994 in Moss Norway we had very fine conditions for the measuring. Specially the weather was perfect. The float test again became the major event.

This year the result was better than in Hellerup 93 where 2/3 of the boats did not pass the test.

Out of the 10 boats "only" 3 failed but some of the boats that passed put in additional buoyancy material when they found out they where picked out for the test.

Again criticism of the float test was caused by the problem of increased weight after a float test. Many found it unfair for those few who where chosen (randomly) to get this handicap shortly before racing.

This caused a compromise at the AGM which means at next WC all prizewinners **must** be float tested after the regatta, and the failed boat(s) will be disqualified from the races. It is a very hard way to do it but the only way to avoid float test before the regatta without taking all boats for a test.

However.

We all know how busy people are to get the boat on the trailer after a regatta, therefore it will be possible to get an official float test carried out on an earlier stage during the regatta.

All float tests will be carried out under the superintendence of the chief measurer. More about float test under amendments.

Amendments 1995

At the IYRU meeting 94, our amendments were accepted but with one exception. In the appendix concerning "Guidance for Additional Buoyancy" we wanted to include inflatable air bags as accepted buoyancy material.



This was rejected by the Keel Boat Committee for reasons I can understand but not accept in all matters.

Air bags are the only way to secure side tanks that leak very easily (caused by bad fastening). Buoyancy blocks are difficult (if impossible) to get in through the hatch, use of smaller pieces or as granulate, get heavy when wet. As does *in situ* expanding foam materials which are prohibited to be used.

All this means, when float tested the air bags (if there are any) must be taken out of the boat, which is a difficult task to do and very easily causes a puncture.

Included in the Guide will be an appendix which contains a "Guide-line for Float Test".

This is to ensure a homogeneous way to do the float test all over the world and of course to avoid discussions at the regatta about how long the boat must be under water.

Moreover the guidelines enclose a demand to the club arranging the regatta, that there must be at least one motor pump with a large capacity and able to get through the hole to the double bottom.

Rule 3.8.2 is changed (concerning the number of turnbuckles used) and rule 3.5.3.1 (concerning boom definition).

This is all for this time. I look forward to see you in Versoix in July at the WC.

Don't forget to bring your swimsuit.

Boom

"Tapered or permanently bent booms are prohibited."

Insert

"Tapered or permanently bent booms between the measurement bands are prohibited."

Rule 3.8.2

Rigging Adjustment

The lengths of the shrouds and the forestay shall be altered only by one turnbuckle each.

Guide lines for Additional Buoyancy. appendix to IYCR 3.2.12
see also Measurement Manual 8.2

An Yngling with 0.4m³ buoyancy blocks will normally not be able to fulfil the Float Test (IYCR 3.2.12) and it is then necessary to put in additional buoyancy material.

By experience the required amount of additional buoyancy material is about sum 0.1m³ – 0.15 m³ of which the most shall be placed in front of the cockpit area.

The additional buoyancy material can be in the form of one or more of the following:

Buoyant rigid foam or expanded polystyrene.

Closed cell foams as for instance PVC and PE.

It is not allowed to use foams expanded in situ, such as side tanks, double bottom, etc ...

Guide line for Float Test

All hatches must be open. This means hatches in side tanks, in fwd./aft. bulkheads, double bottom (high or low) the hull shall be totally filled with water.

To ensure this the boat shall (when filled with water) be tipped 30 degrees to each side where after the crew must go first to the stern then to the stem of the boat. The idea is that the boat must be able to float only on the additional buoyancy material and all air must be out of the hull.

Then the boat shall float level with the crew in the cockpit area (IYCR 3.2.12).





Situation Analyses

I hear many comments and reports from Denmark, Sweden, Holland, Italy, Austria etc, about the price of the Yngling and the marketing of the Yngling in Europe.

It seems that the Yngling's European / Scandinavian price is prejudicial to the expansion of the class. The marketing of the boat is left up to the IYA and the NYA's alone rather than the licensed builders of the area.

Background

Licenses for building in Europe and Scandinavia must have the consent of the Designer Mr Jan Linge due to his agreement with the IYA and the IYRU. This agreement was written and signed many years ago (1979) and was made to protect the following:

Designers' patent rights and remuneration for inventing, designing, developing plugs, moulds and promotional costs.

Builders costs such as establishing working moulds, storage, promotion, staff training and skilling, business overheads ie. insurances etc.

Members of the International Yngling Association so that authentic Ynglings can be built at a fair market price and that the quality of manufacture will ensure a long and serviceable life.

IYRU's concept of International One Design, rules and commitment to sailors world wide.

Present Situation

The design of the Yngling now 25 years old is virtually locked into a manufacturing specification which controls the materials and labour to produce a hull and keel.

The current builders are all situated in countries which are not members of the EEC. This means extra tariffs and taxes for every one in Europe that wants to import a new boat.

In Norway and in Switzerland labour costs are extremely high.
(Labour actually amounts to two thirds of the cost of the boat).

Labour and material cost in Australia are low, but transport to Europe is high.

Material costs in the USA are low and labour costs are moderate and again transport to Europe is high.

Cost Formula

Yngling =
{[1/3 Materials + 2/3 labour]
x margin} x taxes
+ transport + IYRU Fees

To reduce the price, you must reduce material cost and/or labour cost and/or margins.

For European buyers be aware the taxes will vary between builder countries and non builder countries.

The present builders should examine the costs involved and may be able to find ways of reducing the price.

Fair Prices

The IYA can do some research on the fairness of the price by seeking quotes from other class builders in Europe.

If this does anything at all at least it will make everyone aware of the market price.

We can also do research outside of Europe using IYRU Class builders from eg. Turkey, South Africa, Egypt etc.

Does this sound strange?

I don't think so. I know for a fact that the South Africans are building J22's at a very competitive price.

The Yngling Magazine

The response this year is much better which heartens me. I have a unique opportunity to study (and sometimes decipher) the articles, opinions and suggestions put forward for publication. It is a forum for all to have their say, as long as it is printable! It is a pleasure to print on recycled paper the many constructive and bright things happening all around the Yngling world. I would like to congratulate all the Yngling Friends World-wide who contributed to the magazine and a special thanks to the Advertisers.

ALSO these countries are outside of the present European Builders Agreement!

PLUS we may be able to expand the Class into another continent and more countries as well!

For the Future

Better decisions are a result of better information and the IYA has the duty of firstly finding out the facts and then offering a range of solutions.

It is important to have such issues opened up for discussion and put on the agenda of the NYA's as well as the IYA.

I will be putting forward a motion that we seek information from our licensed builders about their building costs and marketing programs, and that the IYA through it's NYA's seek quotes from IYRU builders in their countries and outside Europe.

New builders? If required?

Three possibilities:

Invite the present builders to engage into a fiscal agreement so that the moulds could be leased to lower cost builders.


Invite a new non European builder to purchase a set of moulds.

The IYA purchases its own moulds, then uses a non European IYRU builder of its choice.

To achieve this the IYA would have to raise funds from merchandising, or maybe a special subscription for say 3 years or attract a sponsor who may in return have Y Magazine advertising rights.



FOLK BOATS mean practice



We Couldn't Wait

"And the winner is ... SYDNEY". With these words Juan Antonio Samaranch, president of the International Olympic Committee, announced to the world that Sydney, Australia, was their choice of venue for the Olympic Games in the year 2000.

But we couldn't wait that long to show ourselves off to the world. That is why Sydney is hosting the Yngling World Championships in January 1996. Our Yngling visitors will have the chance to sail on Sydney Harbour on the same waters where the Olympic regattas will be held in September 2000.

Of course, Australia is in mid-summer mode at Christmas time, with many people taking their annual holidays in January to coincide with the hot weather. Sydney's temperatures in January have a mean daily maximum of 25.8 deg. C and a minimum of 18.9 deg. C. Most afternoons on the harbour are blessed by the arrival of the cooling North - Easterly wind which makes for great sailing conditions.

Multicultural Sydney is a most exciting city to visit. Local travel is not expensive, nor is food, which is amazingly varied. Restaurants cater for all tastes and pockets.

Our spectacularly beautiful Harbour is the setting for many popular events.

On Boxing Day, December 26, the Harbour is alive with yachts starting on the 630n. mile Sydney - Hobart ocean race. The attendant spectator fleet also has to be seen to be believed, as they try to follow the competitors out of the Harbour and send them on their way in this notoriously tough racing classic. New Year's Eve brings out another host of spectator craft for the annual fireworks which are let off from barges in the Harbour, city buildings, and even from the Harbour Bridge itself.

The Sydney Festival and Carnivale is held from January 6-26 and comprises cultural events including free outdoor rock, jazz, symphony and opera concerts in the Domain Park, a special race for ferries on the Harbour, and performances by local and international arts groups to appeal to all tastes.

Some of these events take place in the Sydney Opera House complex designed by Danish architect, Joern Utzon.

The ocean beaches in metropolitan Sydney are easily accessible, whether you go to Manly by ferry, or travel by bus to the furthest north, Palm Beach. Here is another beautiful sailing area, Pittwater, adjacent to the mouth of the Hawkesbury River.

South of Sydney, you can travel by train to Bondi beach, and to the southernmost beach of the Sydney region, Cronulla adjacent to the waterway of Port Hacking. Three hours' drive north of Sydney is the famous Hunter Valley wine region.

Sydney is surrounded by huge national parks, which are now recovering well from the devastating bushfires of 1994, and all boast spectacular scenery. These include the Blue Mountains, a 1000 metre plateau 100k west by train. The rugged bushland and deep gorges presented an impenetrable barrier to the early explorers seeking to expand the settlement and find arable land.

The Australian International Yngling Association is looking forward to welcoming YOU to join us for the 1996 Worlds, and make your own exploration in Sydney.

Youth Sailing

Botany Bay Youth Academy has now introduced +300 youngsters to the sport from schools and now from the Disadvantaged Youth Pilot Program of the NSW Department of Sport and Recreation and Aus Sail.

The pilot program gives children who live in the outer suburbs of Sydney an opportunity to get involved in the healthy sport of sailing. Some of the kids have never seen the sea let alone go sailing!

If you asked them "Would you like to go sailing?" the reply would be "In your dreams!"

but when you tell them its possible and this is how you can do it, the answer changes quite rapidly to "Can I - when - I'm ready".

We went to an outer Sydney suburb, known for its industry and not much else. (60 kms from the coast)

Trailering an Yngling we drove onto a dry and dusty football oval beside a school to launch the program.

Immediately we were swarmed by kids.

I wound the window down and jokingly asked "Is there any water around here?" and one replied "No mister, nobody goes fishing out here!"

The Department was right, these kids need to get a wider view and Botany Bay Youth Academy and their Yngling Friends are doing so, right now. The Academy now has 5 Ynglings.

The Royal Sydney Yacht Squadron also has 5 Ynglings and these are used for the Youth Sailing Program and now for the Women's Sailing Program.

The boats provide a perfect platform to learn to sail because of their ease of use and high manoeuvrability. For the advanced sailors they can increase their skill levels and enjoy the tactical benefits of the boat.

This year the early inaugural intake of trainees at the Royal Prince Edward Yacht Club were also instructed in Ynglings.

Fun in the Sun

The National Championship was fun for all. The racing was fantastic with battles all over the best playground in the world, Sydney Harbour.

The battle for the winner was between the Nev Wittey and David Lumb teams. It has to be said that there were other teams out in front at times (Warn, Wood, Harper) but this pair excelled in providing highly entertaining and skilful racing.



It appeared as if the organisers had tied 20m of rope between them, tack for tack and gybe for gybe (and there were lots of them) they remained locked together. The champagne flowed when David finally headed Nev across the line in the 6th race.



The Yngling 2004 - can it survive?

This headline might be a little provoking, and it is meant to be so. This Magazine contains mostly positive articles about the past, which is very relevant and provides a good feeling of being part of an International Class. But we have to take up the discussion about the Yngling heading towards year 2004 - ten years from now!

Before this, just a few words about my Yngling background. I bought my first Yngling in 1969 and became involved in: the development of a boat into a racing boat, the formation of Dansk Yngling Klub an active committee member for four years and raced successfully for seven years - (2 x WC, 2 x Danish Championships). I therefore am aware of the early history of the Class and I think it is time to talk about the future, in the sense of:

- 1 The development of the Yngling Class in different countries.
- 2 The marketing of boats and price policy in Europe.
- 3 Keeping the boat modern and attractive.

1 Many positive things have happened to the boat, and the Class has proven to be a solid concept. For the boat to survive in the ten years to come, maintain its IYRU International Status and be able to compete with the attractiveness of faster and cheaper boats, we must look at each country and set up a strategy for growth.

What are the strategies for each country heading towards 2004?

*Goals in boat numbers, events and PR activities.

*Find new ways of growth, like implementation of the Danish concept (using the Yngling as a training boat in Yacht Clubs which is the key to the success of the Yngling in Denmark)

How can we implement the strategies?

*Set up plans and time tables and get people who can help involved.

What can the IYA do?

The IYA should work out a catalogue of ideas containing ways to promote the Yngling and exciting methods of recruiting more active sailors into the class. (the catalogue should contain ideas sent to the editor of this magazine - what about a competition between readers?) The goals of each country and the IYA should be very clear to all Yngling Friends.


2 The price of the Yngling in Europe has reached a level where only a few can and will participate. In the Yngling Mag 94, the Australians were advertising the price, by offering travel to Australia including a new boat for the same price of a new European Yngling, (the same goes for the double bottom - buy 4 in Australia and ship them to Europe and you still save money compared to the same quantity bought in Europe).

In short the enormous price for a 21' boat has kept the class from expanding in the present and potential Yngling countries in the European area.

And this is not acceptable!

(What about Poland, the former DDR, and the Baltic countries?)

There is a responsibility for the licensed builders to be able and willing to build and market the Yngling professionally at an affordable price.



This I find is lacking in Europe. A professional and skilful builder of Solings and Dragons has shown interest in the boat and has calculated a considerably lower price than the one presently quoted ... However negotiations stopped and this is not helping the Class.

The present situation in Denmark is, that approx., 50 of the 170 Danish boats are imported from Norway, as second hand boats. I am the owner of a former Dutch boat.

This cannibalising of the fleets in other countries will not build up the Class.

The questions are:

Are the licence holders (Linge & Portier) interested in the expansion of the class?

What will IYA do to improve the situation.

3 Since the boat was introduced in 1968 many things have been changed with the rules of the boat, which is very satisfying. Bailers, double bottoms and the whole concept of trimming has changed. But are the changes fast enough? Some history for you, as DYK representative at the WC in Geneva in 1973, I suggested that bailers and hiking supports for crews should be allowed. As an active sailor I found these were urgently required. It took between 6 and 14 years for these changes.

The IYA has to be more aware and conscious of the overall trends in sailing the Yngling when rewriting the rules in the future.

Which way should the Yngling Class follow?

We can choose to be a free class with large tolerances in measurements and more or less free layout on deck and in the cockpits, or we can choose to be very restrictive.

If the Class Rules had followed the restrictive path, ie no changes on a standard boat, the Yngling would probably not have reached the

success we see today. So please give space for the creativity inside the boat and keep a straight line on the Hull and Rigging.

I think it is due time to wake up and do something about the above matters.

- Lets see some goals and visions for each country
- A reasonable price for new boats
- Rules that keep the boat and rigging fixed but allow for the importance of creativity and development of the boat.

Dutch Dialog

Yngling Club Holland

This report is an overview of sailing in Holland. Last year the Yngling Club Holland operated a new structure to ensure a new breeze through the class.

A development which proved unexpectedly successful in a very short time.

We turned around our organisation from a sailing circus throughout Holland into an organisation with three areas in which local commissioners are responsible for activities in their region.

They want to have that possibility nearby. Our new system gives that opportunity and after half a year we saw the numbers growing again.

A lot of personal dedication is given by the district commissioner's to the new members of the class. They take them out sailing and instruct them how to handle and equip the boat.

Our class measurer Piet Hein Noordenbos also has given an important contribution by developing the polar curves for the Yngling and which are asked for throughout Europe. It's really strange that he does the utmost to send his extensive study for free to our foreign sister organisations and that only the Swiss return their thanks to him. For this year he has developed two new programs. One is an A to Z searchlist concerning everything that has to do with the technical part of the boat and the other program is about the allocation of tasks on board.

And last but not least we restyled our national magazine and is probably now the most beautiful class magazine in Holland.

All these activities result in fleets from 15 to 30 boats racing again. But another problem appears, that is more boats are required in the market than boats offered for sale. One of the reasons is because of our policy ie sailors in other classes are getting interested in the Yngling again another reason is that the activities of our German friends where Paul Niemeyer is doing a tremendous job. Now even our neighbours are looking at the Dutch market for boats and this leads to a stressed market, that pushes up prices and this gives the Yngling Class the image of being a very expensive class compared to other Dutch classes. New boats are desperately needed as a stimulus for the growth, development and continuity of the class. We therefore appeal to Mr LINGE to take some action after years of discussion. With the cooperation of the designer there must be a way to build the boats considerably cheaper. We really hope that in a short time something will be done to achieve a more attractive price setting.

Another development is that we discovered an unknown fleet of Ynglings on the other side of the WORLD. In the Dutch Antilles Curacao we found out that the local Club Asiento owns six Ynglings which are used for weekly racing.



Since then the amount of events increased rapidly and local Yngling sailors were inspired to participate in the activities again.

Regular different kinds of meetings are organised at the clubs (mainly an excuse to drink beer) and more attention has been given to other kinds of sailing such as sailing on the Dutch Wadden shallows and cruising on the Dutch lakes.

It was obvious nowadays that a lot of sailors do not have or want to invest a lot of time in travelling for the possibility of racing.

With all this taken into account the effect of my efforts have decreased.


But my personal love for the Yngling Class has not lessened at all.

In preparation for these events NYK (Norwegian Yngling Association) sent out invitations to 8 teams in January to form a National team with the aim to give them the necessary support and assistance towards these important events.

All in all we feel that the Yngling Class in Norway presently experiences reduced activity. Many of our sailors have established families and their time is occupied by other activities while the recruiting of young and new sailors is somewhat slow.

Recruiting work will therefore be given priority in 1995.

We have also seen reduced participation in our various races this year, which is alarming. New race

During the 25 years existence of the Yngling we have always seen ups and downs, but in general it has always been a popular keelboat and will definitely remain so.

We are optimistic and look forward to a more favourable 1995 season.

Now some words about our main events of the year, The Norwegian Open Championship and the World Championship at Moss.

The preparations by Moss Seilforening were excellent and when they gave us 14 days of beautiful Norwegian summer weather, nothing could go wrong.

The hospitality was overwhelming and we feel sure that nobody would hesitate to return to Moss for another event at some other time.

43 boats took part in the Norwegian Open Championship of which 30 were Norwegian boats, somewhat disappointing as in the last 2 years about 50-60 boats had participated. However, after 4 days of racing in excellent conditions, Danish boats were in first and second place, but encouraging enough in third place was one of our local Moss boats Nor 391.

The Danes are difficult to beat and seem to have a continued strong position in the Yngling Class.

47 boats participated in the WC and again after 4 days of sailing under excellent conditions the final result saw 3 Danish boats on top of the list. We sailors must give our thanks to Moss Seilforening for perfect arrangements.



Unfortunately for various reasons only 3 teams found time to participate. The idea being the more experienced teams could mix with the fresh new ones.

The 3 teams participating had several training sessions under the guidance of experienced trainers.

Although we did not get the full effect of this work in 1994 it should be continued as it is of great importance and benefit to the Class.

formats will have to be looked at to attract the sailors. The Norwegian Cup, comprising 7 races in the season, was supported by only 42 boats in total, out of which about half, only participated in one race! The new committee has a lot of hard work in front of them.

This might give the impression that we are somewhat depressed with regard to the Yngling situation in Norway but this is not fact.



We would also like to mention that Norwegian boats participated in the open Danish Championships for Juniors as well as the Nordisk Championship also held in Denmark. We would also like to congratulate our Norwegian Ladies team participating in the IYRU WC in La Rochelle with a Silver Medal, three of the four ladies are active Yngling Sailors.

We look forward to seeing you all during the forth coming season 1995.

Challenge to Mr Linge!

The following formulae is used to determine the Tonnage of Vessels. It was universally used by Registers of Shipping throughout the world so that the ships manifest could be completed for the safe carriage of passengers.

It was also used for rating of vessels for racing.

The challenge is did our award winning designer conform to the formulae and what is the real tonnage of the YNGLING?

Tonnage of Vessels
Board of Trade Method

Divide the length of the upper deck between the aft part of the stem and the fore part of the stern post into six equal parts, and note the foremost, middle, and aftermost points of the division.

Measure the depths at these three points in feet and tenths of a foot: also the depths from the underside of the upper deck to the ceiling of the limber-strake: or in the case of a break in the upper deck, from a line stretched in continuation of the deck. For the breadths divide each deck into five equal parts and measure the inside breadths at the following points, vis: at point 2 and point 8 from the upper

deck and the foremost and aftermost depths: and from point 4 and point 8 from the upper deck of the amidship depth. Take the length at half the amidship depth from the after-part of the stem to the fore - part of the stern post.

Then to twice the amidship depth add the foremost and after most depths for the sum of the depths and add together the foremost upper and lower breadths, 3 times the upper breadths with the lower breadths at the midship and the upper and twice the lower breadths at the after - division for the sum of the breadths.

Mutiply together the sum of the depths, the sum of the breadths, and the length, and divide the product by

3500, which will give the number of tons or " Register". If the vessel has a poop or half deck, or a break in the upper deck, measure the inside mean length, breadth, and height of such parts thereof as may be included within the bulkhead: multiply these three measurements, and divide the product by 92.4 : the quotient will be the number of tons to be added to the result as ascertained above.

The answer of course will be provided by Mr H Linge.

It will be checked by our Chief Measurer Per Thorshoej and Naval Architect Peit Hein Noordenbos and will be available to all at the WC in Geneva.

Ingalls wins 94 Yngling North Americans

Twenty one Yngling teams from Florida, Iowa, Minnesota, Michigan, New York, North Carolina and Rhode Island descended on Alpena Yacht Club on Aug 10 to contend for the 1994 North American Championships. The site for the competition was beautiful Thunder Bay on Lake Huron, the event hosted by the fastest growing fleet in the Yngling Class Association.

The Yngling is a 21 foot "little brother" of the Soling designed by Jan Linge to be the youth training boat for teams aspiring to keelboat competition in the Olympics. It has become known in the US for its gracious hull shape, sensitivity to helm and sail shaping, and its easy trailering.

In recent years its annual Championship has been dominated by Ellie Field of Sakonnet, RI, former Captain of the Brown College Women's Sailing team and whose husband, John Ingalls, is the US builder of the Yngling.

This year Ingalls chose to demonstrate his new DeWolf Yngling on the race course, while Field defended her title aboard Teal, US 1, the first Yngling to be registered in the USA some 25 years ago. The decision set the theme of the 1994 event: a family affair.

When the starting gun sounded for the 1st race on Thursday, the competitors must have wondered how the bay got its name, because the light westerly breeze seldom rose above 5 knots, the big lake was calm as a pond, and the wind shifts were at times unpredictable. Alpena skipper, Al Kelsey, turned his local knowledge to great advantage on the first downwind leg of the Windward/Leeward course by gybing away from the fleet to catch a rising shaft of new air that propelled him from mid fleet to a nice lead at the leeward mark. Defending champ Ellie had to settle for 2nd place.

By afternoon, the wind had settled into a 5-10 knot breeze from the SE, and Field won the race going away from the fleet, so after the first days races, she led the standings with Ingalls in 2nd place and Walter Pratt of Minnetonka MN 3rd.

Friday the pleasant SE breezes continued but a sudden backing to the east favored Ingalls and Ankeny of Minnetonka, who had chosen the left side of the course for their 1st beat. The lead changed between them several times but, in the end Ingalls prevailed over Ankeny with Kelsey in 3rd.

Local sea breezes built throughout lunch and soon everybody knew how Thunder Bay got its name! The 2nd and particularly the 3rd races of the day were sailed in heavy air on a steep, short chop that sent Ynglings surfing downwind on long spinnaker runs that had the teams from Minnesota and Iowa lakes buzzing with excitement.

Ingalls won the 2nd race with superior boat speed both up and downwind, with Bruce Chafee of

Sakonnet finishing 2nd and Bill Tomlinson of Minnetonka 3rd. Then Chafee stormed to an early lead in the 3rd race, leaving Ingalls and Field to finish 2nd & 3rd.

After 5 races, the Sakonnet teams were clearly the best on the water. Ingalls had taken the overall lead, with Field, 2nd, and Chafee not far behind. Pete Ankeny and Jim Leslie of Minnetonka, MN were tied for 4th place.

Saturday the winds abated and settled back to a comfortable 6-8 knots from the SE and the windward / leeward course was run along the breakwater of the Alpena Harbour where the local spectators turned out to watch the competition. Visitors watched the local Alpena yachts head for the breakwater right after the start and on every beat thereafter. The spectators must have enjoyed the show and the local teams enjoyed wonderful lifting starboard tacks that sent many visiting teams who chose the left side of the course to despair. Field moved quickly to the front in the 2nd race and held on to win, Ingalls 2nd and Chafee 3rd.

Then in the final race Ingalls overtook Tomlinson on the last leg to clinch the Championship. The President Brad Jones nipped ahead of Tomlinson at the finish line while Field had to settle for 4th place.

At the awards banquet all agreed that it was one of the best North Americans ever, with a variety of challenging winds and wave conditions, a great battle for the top 10 places, and wonderful hospitality by the Alpena host club. The trophy will go back again to Ellies' home but the name inscribed this year will be that of her husband John Ingalls.

The 1995 Championships move to Lake Minnetonka in the Twin Cities' suburbs and then onto Okoboji, IA in 1996.

Surfing in the Steep Chop

In the afternoon of the 2nd day of the North Americans at Alpena, the sea breezes filled in to 20+ knots and the waves built up to a steep 4-5 foot chop on the course.

On "Non Sequitur", we were excited to be the 2nd boat around the windward mark in the first race after lunch, only to watch in dismay as first John Ingalls, then Pete Ankeny, and then Ellie Field sailed by us as though we had a sea anchor out our stern.

So that evening at the club I followed my No 1 rule for correcting Brain Dead Performance and I cornered Ellie for some advice. Here it is as best I remember it:

Skipper sits to windward and steers the boat to take "push" from larger troughs created by multiple large waves.

As boat's stern rises, skipper pumps mainsheet and middle crew (standing forward on centre line of boat) pumps spinaker guy and sheet to propel boat onto surf.

Skipper steers down trough, avoids burying bow and maintains fast track as long as possible. Front crew sits to leeward, stabilises boom with back or hand, uses body weight to keep boat flat, watches conditions astern and keeps skipper advised of problems or opportunities developing. (Of course it must have helped to have veteran Noel Field on board and Molly was certainly no slouch on the spinaker either!)

I noticed that Pete kept his spinaker pole pointed up a bit more than usual (to open the slot and lift the boat?) and he was definitely Mach 1 as he shot by us downwind!

I asked Ellie about how to avoid "Death Rolling" that moment when increased wind hits, and the boat rolls / heels to windward before surging. She said: "pump that main".

We experimented with leaning forward to start the surfing and leaning aft as far as possible to hold the surfing, and that seemed to help.

As John passed us, I noticed him angle his body way back to the windward end of the traveller and hold it there as he pumped his boat into a long surf downwind.

By the last race I tired out and lost the steering and sheet / traveller-easing rhythm necessary to keep the boat flat and dry in the steeper chop. So we took on a lot of water and it took the whole downwind leg to clear it through our small bellow - waterline bailers. How I longed for the self bailing feature of the new DeWolf Yngling. John Ingalls assured me that he'll have the new cockpit sole kits available before too long so those of us who take on water can get rid of it easily without the distraction of using the pumps.

A note from Bruce and a question






